

MEMBERSHIP REPORT



There were 797 financial members register this season. This was another club record and the largest increase (14%) since the 2009/10 season. The increase in membership was primarily due to a bigger nipper intake and associated families. Active patrolling membership increased by 14% which is encouraging given the decline over the previous 5 seasons.

Nipper intake was again the highest ever with 249 juniors hitting the beach in December in addition to the 22 SRC program participants, an increase of 31%!



Gender balance of the club was 49% female & 51% male the same as last season. The Board was 37% male and 63% female. Local membership (Inverloch & surrounds) remained at 15%.

It is due to all our amazing patrollers that we can keep our amazing beach patrolled and safe all summer long. This season we had 4 patrols with approximately 40 members in each, who together successfully completed 6 rescues, 41 minor first aids and 2 major first aids. We had a total beach attendance of approximately 11,418 with 1,952 preventative actions completed throughout the season and a total of 1,712.17 hours of patrol, thank you to all members who helped contribute to this number.

COMPETITION REPORT

Competition is a very important part of surf lifesaving and allows members to enhance their skills while enjoying a sport that takes you all over the coast of Victoria and even interstate. Training for competition and for those who just wanted to improve their skills began in September and was available on many weekends over summer and beyond. It was awesome to see so many attendees and I hope to see everyone again when training recommences after winter.

A new senior team was also formed, with which we competed at Ocean Grove, Bancoora, Mordialloc, Pt. Leo and Youth/senior state championships at Warrnambool. Although the team consisted of 3 under 14 boys, they certainly showed the rest of the state just how competitive they are by placing in many finals and just missing out on 3 medals at states in various events.

My vision for the next few years regarding competition is to try and establish teams in each age group so that kids can go to carnivals and compete together. I hope to see numbers increase gradually over the next few years with the hope of a strong junior, senior and masters' team competing around the state representing Inverloch SLSC.

An IRB winter competition team is also currently training, which should see Inverloch competing at IRB carnivals this time next year.

With increasing competitor numbers, our club must provide officials and water safety at competitions so if you can help-out in this way please let me know and we will make sure you are trained in the respective role, ready for next season.

Again, I'd like to thank the members and committee of the club for helping me find my feet in my new role and for supporting me in many ways. I look forward to continuing the growth of sport within our club and seeing Inverloch go from strength to strength.

FINANCE

The year ending 31 May 2019 was a successful financial year. Having been involved in the club for approximately eight years, I was delighted to take on the role as Treasurer and to have a positive impact on the ongoing commercial sustainability of the club and provide an enjoyable environment for our members and visitors to enjoy our much Inverloch surf beach.

Oh-what a season!

We were blessed with fabulous weather, our largest group of Nippers ever and growing numbers of families participating in the activities offered at the club. Membership income increased by over \$5k this year with total membership income of \$69k.

We are members not customers.

As a volunteer-based member organization, it is important we remember that we are not customers. Membership requires us all to do more than just pay our membership. We depend on many volunteers to help the club operate and deliver our core purpose of a safe patrolled beach. The ultimate success of our club relies on the discretionary effort of us all. It is pleasing to see the numbers of members helping in many ways; from cooking the BBQ, making and selling cupcakes, age managing, patrolling and serving at the bar. The person that most inspired me was a member that approached me during nippers one day and asked me where they could find a broom and cleaning materials. They then cleaned the toilets and sand out of the bathroom's downstairs. Thank you!

Donors and sponsors we love you.

Donations and sponsorships totaled \$30k, an increase of \$9k over the last year. A big shout out to our sponsors LJ Hooker, the Gippsland Veterinary Group and RACV Inverloch Resort. A big thank you to our many donors including the numerous families, Tyers Primary School, Inverloch Lions Association and Inverloch RSL. I would like to acknowledge the tireless work of Peter Harrison organizing the annual tin raffle and thanks you to everyone that participated. All our donations and sponsorships enable us to operate effectively and continue to invest in improvements.

The Deck - no better place to chill out!

The Deck was a highlight of the season. With a new range of drink and food options available, The Deck was a hit for many members and visitors. Many thanks to our Life Members Alan Bolton and Maureen Ansell for their amazing effort in running and coordinating the bar. We had a few members help and we are always looking for more volunteers. We will provide opportunities for our members to obtain their RSA throughout the year so they can help. From personal experience, it is a lot of fun and a great way to meet our members and visitors.

Thanks also to Claudia Cox for making the fabulous cheese and cold meat platters to enjoy on a sunny evening with a spritz, a glass of bubbles or a cold soft drink. I enjoyed meeting several new families and

not having to cook for a few nights thanks to the food truck options that were available Thanks to Fiona McMahon-Hughes for coordinating the food trucks. We look forward to even better food and drink options for the coming season. Bar sales totaled \$12.5k, a 24% increase from last year.

Club Wear or Street Wear - why not both?

Our new merchandise range including official Club Wear and our new range of Street Wear was popular. Clothing sales totaled almost \$20k, doubling last year's clothing sales. Thanks to the incredible efforts of Ione McKenzie for dealing with our supplies in relation to design and logistics and to Rosemary Neville for organizing uniform shop operations. It was an incredible effort and a solid contributor to the clubs financial performance this year.

Grants - a couple of late successes.

Grant income this year was approximately \$18k less than the prior year. However, there have been some last-minute grants awarded which will make up for this shortfall and will put us on par with last year. The funds are yet to be received however, have been confirmed. Consistent with our commitment to sustainability, our grant funding this year went towards purchasing a solar off grid power storage unit used temporarily on our tower and will be used on our new patrol tower solution in the coming year.

Investments

This year we invested in upgrading the seating up on The Deck and completed some much-needed maintenance on the clubhouse floors. We also invested in a new IRB motor. Importantly, for the Nippers program, we purchased additional swim cans which meant that we were able to effectively separate our groups - no more boards crashing into swimmers. We are still getting used to our new digital radios however, operationally the club set up new flag stands and purchase new flippers for our patrollers.

Special mentions

Many thanks again to our Telstra volunteers that came and did significant building maintenance work, a special mention to Geoff Moss from Telstra for coordinating this with his team. Many thanks to Trevor Dando for his fabulous work as treasurer last year. Trevor undertook a significant upgrade to our accounting systems which made life easy for me. A special mention to Claudia Cox and her family and team who again ran a very smooth kiosk operation so greatly valued by members and visitors to our beach. FCIA were appointed as the auditors at the last AGM for preparing this year's financial statements and those that are included and the end of this report.

In summary;

- Total club income was \$169k, an increase of 10% on last year;
- Profit was \$58k, an increase of \$10k on last year (on a cash basis).
- Cash on hand increased by \$36k

The financial statements presented are interim and have been prepared on a cash basis. They will be reviewed by our auditors and restated so they comply with accounting standards. The official financial statements will be circulated in September following the audit.
