2. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2.1 THE CLUB CONTINUES TO GROW

This year has been a very successful year for the club with the completion of our first full patrol season, our first carnival held at our beach, and our first representation at competitive level. Our membership increased while the patrolling membership doubled.

2.2 OUR FIRST FULL SEASON

This is the first season that the club has patrolled the beach for a full season with a group of dedicated life savers who worked tirelessly to provide a safe swimming environment for the public including local's and holiday makers.

Over the period of the season from the last weekend in November to the end of Easter, the club completed all patrols with a full team available throughout the season.

2.3 MEMBERSHIP

It has been very pleasing to see our membership grow with the total membership now 234 compared with last year's total of 171. An important part of the that membership is the group who make up the patrols and it is again pleasing to report that the total patrolling membership has grow to 28 compared with last year's total of 12. This group has an excellent mix of male and female members. Eight of our patrolling members have also undertaken extended training in Advanced Resuscitation.

These impressive increases indicate the club has strong future.

2.4 FINANCE

It is pleasing to note that the club was able to purchase all the patrol equipment necessary to safely patrol the beach and still have funds on hand at the end of the season. This was achieved through the income from our membership and substantial donations. The club really appreciates the support the local and general community is providing to help build and maintain the service we provide to the area.

2.5 EQUIPMENT

During the season the club completed the purchase of all our patrol equipment and gained an additional Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) which will enable the club to provide patrol services and train during the same period.

2.6 COMPETITION

The club colours were worn in competition for the first time during the year by Stacey Allan at a state competition. While some 28 of our junior nipper members competed in their first event at the Cape Patterson beach during January.

The club hosted the first carnival on our beach when we joined with our neighbouring clubs of Cape Paterson and Venus Bay for a junior nipper's carnival when we had over 100 junior lifesavers competing in a fun filled day. In addition our beach was used for a senior carnival after it was transferred from Venus Bay due to unsafe conditions.



2.7 THANK YOU

My special thanks go to the committee who have worked very hard behind the scenes to ensure that the club has the equipment and facilities to operate. Equally important are our sponsors who have been prepared to help the club with money, materials and equipment throughout the season, without their generous help the club would not have been able to provide the services to the community. The patrolling members of the club have delivered an extremely valuable service during the season and all have patrolled beyond the usual hours to ensure that club completed the season.

With his help throughout the season the club has been able to gain an insight to the administration of a Surf Life Saving club. He has always been available when needed to provide much needed and valued advice.

2.8 THE FUTURE

The club is looking forward to the future with confidence as we have a strong junior membership, a dedicated team of patrolling members and a committed leadership team on the committee.

We now look forward to next season with improved accommodation as we take delivery of an air-conditioned portable building. This will provide a temporary base for the club while active planning continues for permanent club accommodation in the vicinity of the patrolled beach.

3. CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

After probably one of the longest inaugural seasons known to mankind, Inverloch SLSC's members find themselves attending their second Annual General Meeting. But, this time, despite the fantastic efforts of everyone involved in that first season, there are differences. This time, in respect of season 1999/2000, Inverloch SLSC's members stood up as one entity, without any direct outside assistance and showed we can do this!

A very diverse group of people of all ages, fitness levels and qualifications have now demonstrably provided preventative and operational lifesaving services to the Inverloch district over one of the longest and trying official seasons in memory. That there was very little operational experience within the group makes the total achievement more remarkable. Sure, along the way we have averted many threatening situations and rescued when necessary but the returns are much greater than the published statistics.

The unflagging efforts and behind the dunes support of the Executive and Committee for the patrolling members has made our club viable as an SLSC. The individual inputs of our President, Secretary, Treasurer and all Committee members (and supporters) go way beyond both the season dates and the call of duty.

As a result of their efforts, we have now watched over 200 'nippers' get their first taste of water safety, supervised activities and in some cases, healthy competition. We have now qualified a very dedicated group of lifesavers in all manner of disciplines covering Surf Bronze Medallion (the most complex such 'bronze' award available), Advanced Resuscitation, Training Officer, and IRB driving. We have seen our first competitive award won at a gazetted carnival (Iron Nipper – go Josh!). We have hosted both a regional championship (albeit at very short notice) and a Nipper carnival. We now see an Inverloch SLSC uniform on the beaches and streets and carrying respect via its own identity.

Most importantly, our active young (some only at heart) people have acquired and displayed a unique blending of skills, dedication and a profound sense of responsibility. The real benefits of surf lifesaving are what we can do for, and the changes we make in our young people – those patrolling members who actively involve themselves in a team environment which teaches reliance on oneself and each other. What must (and has!) been learnt is that as a team we can meet and overcomes conditions way beyond the resources and abilities of any one individual. In a managed patrol environment we have learnt teamwork and camaraderie not experienced in most other fields of endeavour. We have grown to support and rely upon each other regardless of personalities and points of view.

One of the most telling things I take away from the beach at the end of a patrol day is the knowledge that I could rely upon any of our patrolling members in an emergency – this feeling underlines the character of what our club (and movement) is all about. It may be a simple statement, but those of you now qualified will understand the power, satisfaction and achievement behind the words when I say ' We have patrolled our own beach and environs to a very high standard for an entire season'. Take pride in that as each and everyone of you deserves to.
