PRESIDENT'S REPORT



My second year in the job as President and I have to say no other year has thrown challenges at us quite like the past one we have had. Entering the new season in October we didn't know what the summer would look like, what patrols would consist of, whether Nippers would run, Bronze camps had a question mark over them and socialisation was just a dream. Well, we got through the season with some hard work, tight deadlines, a lot of luck and enormous amount of patience and understanding. All activities ran in one form or another, we put patrols on the beach and I have to say we learnt a lot about ourselves and the processes we have in place. A huge thank

you to the board and their teams who just made it happen with sometimes weeks (not months) to plan with sometimes last-minute changes – we got there!

I'd also like to thank the important jobs many people play on the beach over summer. Our Patrol Captains, Vice Captains and Patrol Leadership Teams play a major role. These leaders within our Club combined with Surf Lifesaving volunteers are responsible in keeping the community safe, providing first aid and surf rescue, and distilling confidence in the public to use the beach and swim between the flags. The season was going along pretty normally until Easter. Great weather and a small surf and I thought we were going to end the season quietly – not so, in a matter of two days we completed two minor rescues, three major first aids, an anaphylactic shock victim and a broken hip that had to be floated out on an IRB from around the caves. Life Saving – expect the unexpected. Without our life savers commitment and dedication, we would not be able to man the 4 patrol teams that make up our rosters. In addition, young people coming through look up to you, our volunteers, as role models, as one day they will fill your shoes.

Our sponsors are an important part of the Club's community, and without their generous support we would not be able to have such fantastic facilities and assets as we do. Thank you to all our sponsors continued support and we look forward to building future relationships.

Nippers once again was a huge success for the Club although we limited numbers due to Covid to previously enrolled members only. We offered a limited program however kids are kids and fun had by all, surf safety education was shared and of course the meeting of new friends. Lucy Chambers and her army of volunteers did a fantastic job as usual. A big thank you to the water safety officers who did an amazing role ensuring every nipper was looked after in the water. This program nurtures tomorrows Lifesavers. The smiles on the kid's faces and the enthusiasm shown by their parents at the individual presentations said it all – next year we hope to be back to normal.

Another special event that takes some co-ordinating is our bronze camps. These occurred in a Covid-safe manner, and again we were lucky to get these off the ground. I am very proud of the young people who run these camps and the support they have behind the scenes. Again, this is the final step from Nippers, Water Safety, SRC to a qualified Bronze Surf Lifesaver. Don't underestimate the life skills these young people learn from the course, not only do they have a lot of fun and make strong friendships, they also learn skills they keep with them their entire life. The trainers are a great bunch of people and I have thanked you before, but again a big thank you.

One programme I am very proud to have been a part of for several years is the Disabled Surfing days held by Disabled Surfing Victoria. Our club is a big supporter of these days with huge turn outs for the two days that are run in February and March. Unfortunately this year they were unable to be held due to Covid and the surfers being in high risk categories, but we hope the days will be back bigger and better than ever next year.

This year Alan and Maureen hung up the boots in their role in running the bar, and Alan as our Licensee Nominee. They retire in this position with our thanks and knowing the legacy they leave will be the backbone of years of enjoyment (and profit) for the club.

On a final note, I would like to thank Alan Bolton and David Shultz who are jointly responsible for the club house management. Several projects will be completed this year – re-keying of the club house, updating the CCTV cameras and WIFI, renewing the windows which became quite weathered in our tough environment and the renewal of the deck – quite an achievement.

It takes many hands to keep the club ticking over, I can't mention everyone, but I'd like to thank all the volunteers who give up their time to make it so successful.

Thank you for all your support during the year and I look forward to the year ahead.

FINANCE & TREASURERS REPORT



Well, that was a season like no other and I have seen a few over the years I can tell you!! Unprecedented, expect the unexpected, surprises everywhere — what an understatement! Everything we planned for and expected to occur went in exactly the opposite direction but luckily, somehow it worked in our favour.

The boring stuff: Taking away the accounting "smoke and mirrors" the club made a surplus, once again, of just under \$40,000 for the season. After everything that has gone on, this is a sensational result and everyone who has worked so tirelessly over the summer and then some can be very proud of this. A huge team effort and my sincere thanks to all concerned.

Cash is King:

Our cash position is in great shape and it's nice to report that we started the year with \$240,757.34 in our bank accounts and finished it with nearly \$10,000 more coming in at \$249,947.65! I wonder how many clubs in Victoria can say they have ¼ of a million dollars in the bank???

The balance sheet remains strong with a good mix of young lifesaving / rescue gear assets as well as the nicer amenities that make the clubhouse a bit more than a building full of sand and wetsuits. Once again, we have no debt to speak of and with our cash backing are unlikely to incur any in the foreseeable future.

We added lots of new Nipper Boards to the asset register. Traded in our old Polaris for a shiny new red one, because red ones go faster!! We have 3 new IRB Motors in the pipeline and dressed up the training room with a sideboard under the TV and nice new chairs to sit on whilst having a frothy! (Thanks Mr Pres)

Fun Facts:

Originally, we were bracing for a tough season thinking Covid would keep people away. What it did was stop them from going overseas or up north for Christmas. You couldn't book a holiday rental for love nor money and the foot traffic at the beach all summer long was massive. How do we know this? Ask Claudia and her band of dedicated workers in the Kiosk - they saw it all this summer!

A normal season in the kiosk usually turns over somewhere between \$40,000-\$45,000 which isn't bad for a 10 x 10 box with more heat in it than the sun, coming from all kinds of food and drink machines. Our previous best season on record had sales of \$47,495. This season, the chaos ran rampant and the sales fell just a whisker short of the \$100,000 mark coming in at \$98,248 – double our best year ever!!!

So, what does a \$100,000 season look like for a Kiosk whose average sale is around \$8-\$10???

\$36,000 - food - think of - 1800 hotdogs, 1000 sweet chilli wraps, 900 salad rolls

\$20,000 - cold drinks - such as 1500 slushies, 700 milkshakes, over 500 smoothies

\$19,000 – Ice creams – that equates to approx. 5000 whinging kids saying its hot and I need an ice-cream!

\$13,000 - hot drinks - I don't even want to calculate how many coffees' that adds up to

\$10,000 – incidentals – lollies, chips, 2-minute noodles, etc.

So, the next time you complain about having to cook a "cheese toastie" think about the dedicated band of wacko's who give up the best part of the day to work behind the counter instead of being on the beach or in the water. That's what being a dedicated lifesaver (and great club member) is all about!!

From the Treasury Department to - Claudia, Tara, Lachie, Georgia, Sarah, Kaitlyn, Pierre and James – thank you does not even begin to cover it. The Kiosk has always been a vital service to the public at our end of Invy (Surf Beach) and a major source of funds for the club. We could not do it without your help.

For those who don't think it's worth the time to take on a shift in the Kiosk maybe think about this: These workers are for the most part school aged lifesavers learning food handling skills, customer service and money handling, not to mention punctuality and reliability. Everyday life skills that will look good on a resume when they face the reality of the big, bad world out there!!

Once again, a dedicated bunch of booze hounds give up their time to man the bar, make new friends, gaze at our magnificent view from the window and put "some roubles" in our bank account.

The bar makes 100% profit each season and is a vital hub in the social fabric of the club and the local territory. It would be fair to say that we had more non-members visiting our humble establishment than members this season and that bodes well for our future and for the revenue it earns the club.

My thanks go out to all and sundry who gave up time to not only man the bar but get their RSA in the first place, so they could. We hope to see you all back next season with a smile on your face and spring in your step. A recent purchase has upgraded our sometimes-temperamental iPad to a new integrated software/hardware Square Register. A few minor test runs have been good so far with no issues reported.

Special Mention:

Alan and Maureen (Fossil and Auntie) have been there since the beginning 7 years ago with Foss as the nominee. Tireless workers, who gave selflessly of their time to not only man the bar but to shop for supplies, re-stock the fridges and bank the takings when needed. After 7 years they have called it a day and hung up their bottle openers. Foss / Auntie – once more you answered the call, gave whatever was needed and made sure that the bar became an integral part of Invy S.L.S.C. Now it's time for you to pass the till onto the next generation and be a customer for a change. Enjoy the view, watch the big screen and sip on a cold one knowing that you started something very special some 7 years ago!!

Finally:

The future is looking good for our club. The winter projects are in full swing and we will even have a new deck before the spring arrives. Will it be a normal season next summer? Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 May 2021

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act . The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(d) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 May 2021

(e) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

(f) Investments

Investments held are originally recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at fair value which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion
