I am delighted to celebrate the remarkable achievements of all our members, both on and off the beach, during the past season. Despite the challenges posed by the Covid pandemic, our club returned to full capacity and witnessed outstanding participation from our members and the local community.

We were thrilled to have had strong participants in our training programs, with a significant increase in volunteer patrollers on the beach. Moreover, the off-beach volunteers were crucial in various areas such as the bar, apparel shop, and Nippers program. Special mention goes to the sausage sizzlers, cupcake makers, and tin rattlers, whose efforts contributed immensely to our club's vibrant atmosphere.

I would like to highlight some of the notable accomplishments that our members were directly involved in this season. We had around 220 Nippers actively engaged in our activities, ensuring the growth and development of our future generation. Furthermore, we achieved higher water safety numbers and witnessed the exceptional dedication of our Age Manager volunteers. Our Nipper competition with Cape Paterson SLSC was a resounding success, and the introduction of loyalty cards and the use of Square technology enhanced the smoother functioning of our activities.

Our training programs also experienced a significant surge in enrolment. We had many trainees in the SRC, Bronze Camp, Adult Bronze, multiple IRB courses, and ART/First Aid. Notably, our Bronze camp had the privilege of hosting a visit from the Westpac helicopter, and our members showcased their talents by participating in local newspaper articles and being interviewed by radio programs.

Additionally, we hosted several noteworthy events including the Pink Patrol brunch and provided a platform for community group meetings. Our Grommet Gurus program expanded its reach and successfully engaged with Brighton Life Saving Club, fostering valuable relationships within the broader community.

Representing the club at local events and initiatives remained a priority. Our members actively participated in the local Inverloch trader's day, local primary school fete, Anzac Day March, Disabled Surf days, and the Cape to Cape Project, where they addressed erosion

issues affecting our clubhouse. Furthermore, our IRB team commenced the season's competitions with increased numbers, reflecting their enthusiasm and dedication. Collaboration with other emergency services departments proved fruitful as we effectively responded to incidents, including the Victorian Floods. Enjoy the 2023/24 season, get involved, and I look forward to seeing you on the beach.

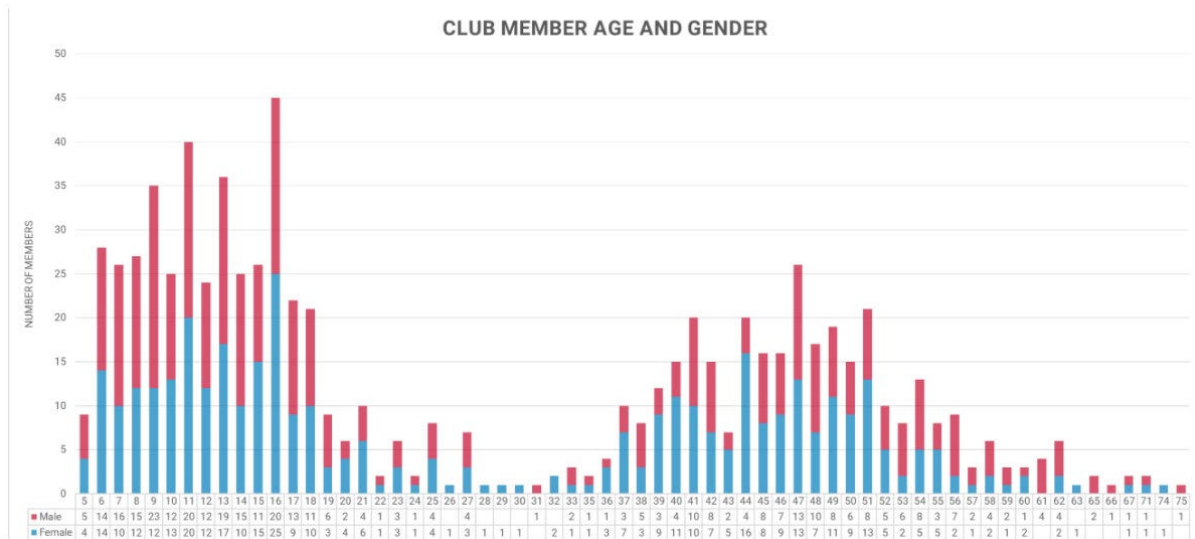

## Chief Instructor Report

And just like that another season of training has come to an end.

Here is a recap of the season in Training.

### Bronze Camps

The Bronze Medallion is a comprehensive and rigorous training program that equips individuals with essential lifesaving skills and knowledge. Throughout the training, they learn skills in various areas, including water rescues, first aid, CPR, surf awareness, and beach management.

This year we had 49 candidates gain this award.

### Adult Bronze

This year the adults hit the water!

## Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ART) + First Aid (FA)

Congratulations to all participants of our ART/FA. We have enormous interest in these Awards, and it was great to see many candidates showing interest in expanding their skills above and beyond their Bronze Award.

This Course equips candidates with the knowledge and abilities to provide crucial emergency assistance to those in need.

Advanced resuscitation techniques are essential for responding to life-threatening situations and emergencies. Through comprehensive training and hands-on practice.

Candidates are able recognize and respond promptly to cardiac arrest, performing chest compressions, rescue breathing, and using automated external defibrillators (AEDs).



In addition to resuscitation techniques, they develop skills in providing first aid. This includes assessing injuries, stabilizing fractures, controlling bleeding, managing shock, allergic reactions, and respiratory distress.



### IRB Drivers and Crew

Due to high demand the club was able to run 2 fantastic IRB Crew and Driver courses for our members. The 2 two courses were full of excitement and eager members who wanted to learn how to utilise our most used form of rescue equipment to greater the community.

The Crews and Drivers undertook rigorous training learning how to navigate large swells, undertake Search and Rescues and work together to coordinate flawless rescues in real life situations.



### Bass Coast Development Camp

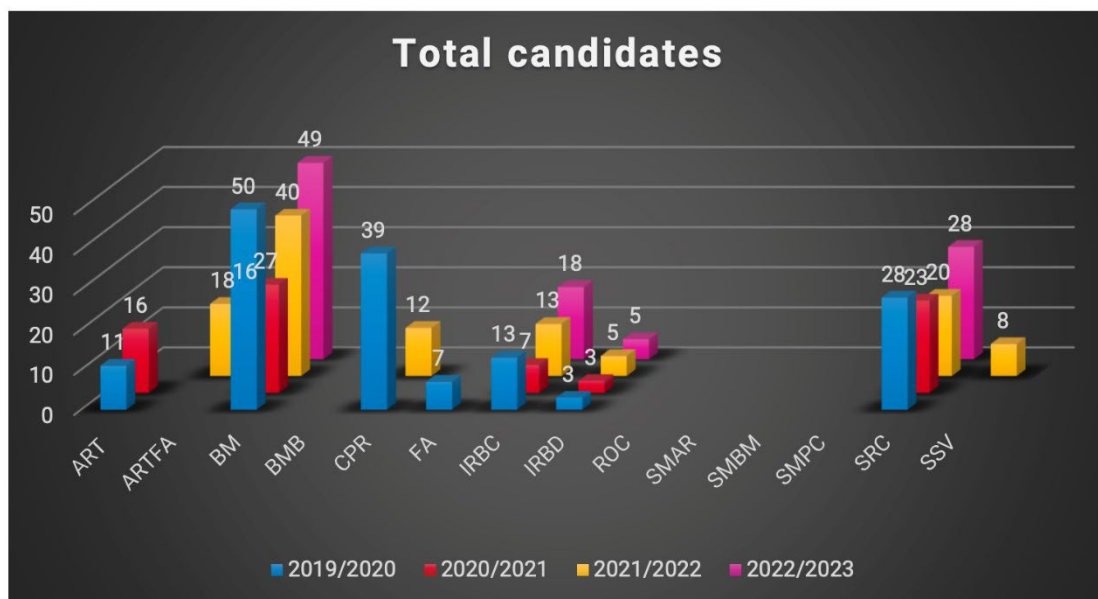
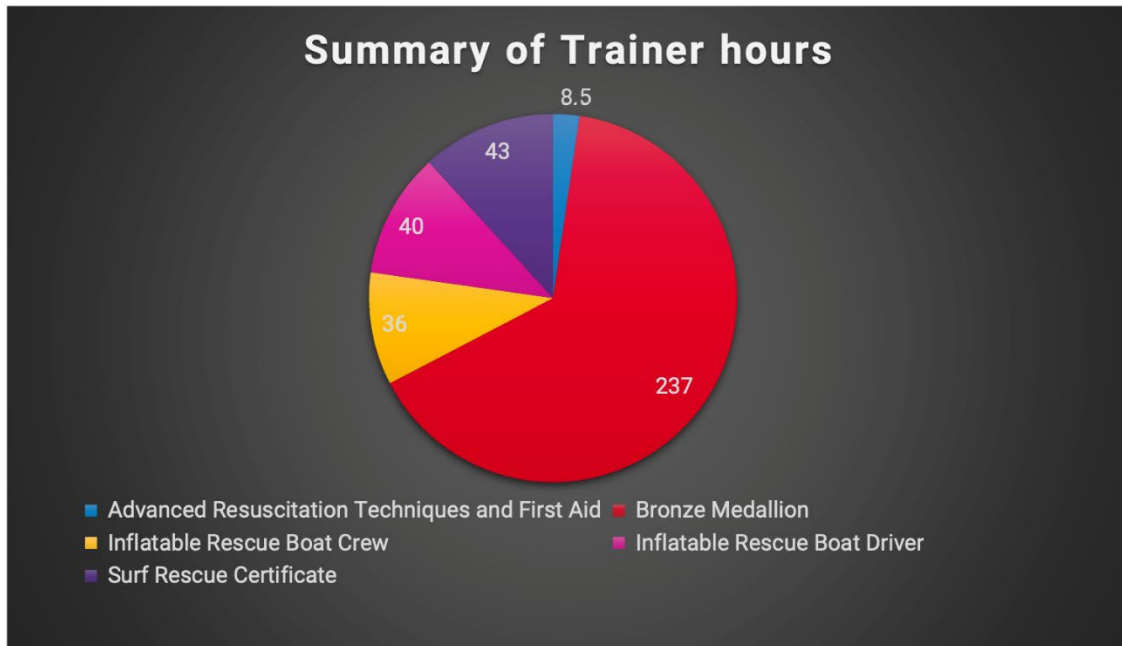

### Under 18s Leadership & Development Camp

U18 Leadership Development Camp was held at Lord Somers Camp on October 7 – 9 2022. Practical training scenarios offer opportunities to build and develop lifesaving skills. The camp aims to inspire participants to maintain their involvement in lifesaving by expanding their understanding of lifesaving pathways and future opportunities within LSV.



### 18-25 Mentor Program

This season Lucy Tate, Brydie Smith and Xavier Korbel attended LSV's 18-25 Mentor Program. The aim of the 18 – 25 year old Mentor Program is to develop young leaders to face the challenges of current and future leadership roles with the support of a Mentor and an enhanced lifesaving network, whilst also providing a platform to enhance their leadership credentials, build on their current skill set and motivate them to reach their leadership goals.

The Mentor Program entails a six-month formal partnership between the Mentor and Mentee. Mentors will guide and support their Mentee through agreed goals, throughout the 2022/23 season.

## Community Relations Report

### Grants

This year ISLSC was fortunate to receive several grants from various Government organisations.

Bass Coast Shire Council provided \$1,000 towards the purchase of our new rainbow rescue board. This board is a very practical and visual demonstration of ISLSC's commitment to diversity and being a welcoming club for all.

Supported by Federal Member Russell Broadbent, ISLSC received a grant to facilitate volunteer participation. In this instance, we applied for funds to purchase 2 new marquees to ensure volunteers are provided with adequate shelter – particularly in the peak of summer.

We also received funding from the Victorian Government in the form of a Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) grant to assist us with the purchase of a new ATV. Given the harsh environment in which we operate, these vehicles require constant maintenance and regular replacement. ## Treasurer Report and Finances

Another season has come and gone but this one had something different to the others of the past. We started the year in what we now call “Covid-Normal” not really knowing how it would compare to the Pre-Covid years.

Looking at the financial results for the season it seems that we had the best of both worlds rolled into one. We got our freedom back with lockdowns now a mere memory and the desire to travel to Inverloch for the summer being stronger than ever.

Season 2022/23 rewrote the record books for the club financially and gave us our best year that I can remember, setting some new benchmarks along the way.

Ignoring the Accounting nuances required under reporting law and going back to the raw figures we see the bar being raised in several areas.

### Records:

- 1) We broke through the \$80,000 mark in Bar Sales for the season.
- 2) Total turnover pushed past the \$300K barrier.
- 3) Surplus (profit) reached its highest point from memory of \$101k and change.
- 4) Total Expenses stayed under \$200K whilst still running a full season on the beach
- 5) We finished the year with \$305K cash in the bank and even peaked at \$310K at one point.

In all, a fantastic year for the club financially!

The Deck Bar once again exceeded all expectations with sales up some \$23K or nearly 40% on last year putting a clear \$40K into the bank for the season.

The Uniform shop had a solid season once again and with our new Captain at the helm (Kirk) we look forward to new colours of streetwear, some old member fav's and one or two surprises not seen in the shop before. But you'll have to wait till next season.

Once again Grants contributed just under \$68K to our income. These Grants purchase so much Lifesaving equipment that we need to operate on the beach each season. While the Grants take care of the Lifesaving stuff this gives the Board the room to concentrate on other things that make the club run smoothly. Things like maintenance, upgrades, services and generally keeping the club running.

**Future Projects:**

As always there are things to be done to keep us in the best shape possible.

Believe it or not our clubhouse is now 12 years old, so you'll see a fresh coat of paint inside this coming spring. The Polaris is past its use by date and needs to be turned over for a newer model. All the lights downstairs are getting an LED upgrade and our Patrol Tower and BBQ trailer need some TLC after spending the year out in the salt air.

No doubt Nippers will get some new boards. A bit of new gear will show up in the garage before next season as the Board and department heads are hard at work getting things ready for the coming summer.

#### Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

##### Basis of Preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act . In the opinion of the committee the association is not a reporting entity because it is not reasonable to expect the existence of users who rely on the association's general purpose financial statements for information useful to them for making and evaluating decisions about the allocation of resources.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporations Act , the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107: Cash Flow Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1031: Materiality and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

The association has concluded that the requirements set out in AASB 10 and AASB 128 are not applicable as the initial assessment on its interests in other entities indicated that it does not have any subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures. Hence, the financial statements comply with all the recognition and measurement requirements in Australian Accounting Standards.

The association has not assessed whether these special purpose financial statements comply with all the recognition and measurement requirements in Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

##### (a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

##### (b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

#### (c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

#### (d) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

The association has applied AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers (AASB 15) and AASB 1058: Income of Not-for-Profit Entities (AASB 1058) using the cumulative effective method of initially applying AASB 15 and AASB 1058 as an adjustment to the opening balance of equity at 1 July 2019. Therefore, the comparative information has not been restated and continues to be presented under AASB 118: Revenue and AASB 1004: Contributions.

In the current year

##### Contributed Assets

The association receives assets from the government and other parties for nil or nominal consideration in order to further its objectives. These assets are recognised in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (eg. AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138).

On initial recognition of an asset, the association recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer).

The association recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

##### Operating Grants, Donations and Bequests

When the association receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (eg. AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138)
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer)
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the association recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

#### Capital Grant

When the association receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The association recognises income in profit or loss when or as the association satisfies its obligations under the terms of the grant.

#### Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

#### Dividend Income

The association recognises dividends in profit or loss only when the right to receive payment of the dividend is established.

#### Income from Sale of Goods

The association publishes and sells books and magazines publications to the general public. Revenue is recognised when control of the products has transferred to the customer. For such transactions, this is when the products are delivered to the customers. Volume discounts could be provided with the sale of these items, depending on the volume of aggregate sales made to eligible customers over every six-month period. Revenue from these sales is based on the price stipulated in the contract, net of the estimated volume discounts. The volume discounts are estimated using historical experience and applying the expected value method. Revenue is then only recognised to the extent that there is a high probability that a significant reversal of revenue will not occur. Where there is expected volume discounts payable to the customers for sales made until the end of the reporting period, a contract liability is recognised.

A receivable will be recognised when the goods are delivered. The association's right to consideration is deemed unconditional at this time as only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due. There is no significant financing component because sales (which include those with volume discounts) are made within a credit term of 30 to 45 days.

Customers have a right to return products within 60 days as stipulated in the current contract terms. At the point of sale, a refund liability is recognised based on an estimate of the products expected to be returned, with a corresponding adjustment to revenue for these products.

Consistent with the recognition of the refund liability, the association further has a right to recover the product when customers exercise their right of return so consequently the company recognises a right to returned goods asset and a corresponding adjustment is made to cost of sales.

Historical experience of product returns is used to estimate of the number of returns on a portfolio level, using the expected value method. It is considered highly probable that significant reversal in the cumulative revenue will not occur given the consistency in the rate of return presented in the historical information.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

#### In the comparative period

Non-reciprocal grant revenue was recognised in profit or loss when the association obtained control of the grant and it was probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant would flow to the entity and the amount of the grant could be measured reliably.

If conditions were attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the association was eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue was deferred until those conditions were satisfied.

When grant revenue was received whereby the association incurred an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this was considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue was recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service had been delivered to the contributor; otherwise the grant was recognised as income on receipt.

The association received non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for no or nominal value.

These assets were recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Donations and bequests were recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue was recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Dividend revenue was recognised when the right to receive a dividend had been established.

Rental income from operating leases was recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant leases.

Revenue from the rendering of a service was recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customer.

(e) **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(f) **Financial Assets**

**Initial recognition and measurement**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either purchase or sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component or if the practical expedient was applied as specified in paragraph 63 of AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers.

#### Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial assets are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost
- fair value through other comprehensive income or
- fair value through profit or loss.

Measurement is on the basis of two primary criteria:

- the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset and
- the business model for managing the financial assets.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is managed solely to collect contractual cash flows and
- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates.

A financial asset that meets the following conditions is subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income:

- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates and
- the business model for managing the financial asset comprises both contractual cash flows collection and the selling of the financial asset.

By default, all other financial assets that do not meet the measurement conditions of amortised cost and fair value through other comprehensive income are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The association initially designates a financial instrument as measured at fair value through profit or loss if:

- it eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency (often referred to as an “accounting mismatch”) that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on them on different bases
- it is in accordance with the documented risk management or investment strategy and information about the groupings is documented appropriately, so the performance of the financial liability that is part of a group of financial liabilities or financial assets can be managed and evaluated consistently on a fair value basis and
- it is a hybrid contract that contains an embedded derivative that significantly modifies the cash flows otherwise required by the contract.

The initial measurement of financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss is a one-time option on initial classification and is irrevocable until the financial asset is derecognised.

#### Derecognition

##### *Derecognition of financial assets*

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All the following criteria need to be satisfied for the derecognition of a financial asset:

- the right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred
- all risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred and
- the association no longer controls the asset (i.e. it has no practical ability to make unilateral decisions to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a debt instrument classified as fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investment revaluation reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity that the association elected to classify as at fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investments revaluation reserve is not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

#### Impairment

The association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on:

- financial assets that are measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income
- lease receivables
- contract assets (e.g. amount due from customers under contracts)
- loan commitments that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss and
- financial guarantee contracts that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Loss allowance is not recognised for:

- financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss or
- equity instruments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

The association uses the following approaches to impairment, as applicable under AASB 9: Financial Instruments:

- the general approach
- the simplified approach
- the purchased or originated credit-impaired approach and
- low credit risk operational simplification.

### Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 May 2023

#### *General approach*

Under the general approach, at each reporting period, the association assesses whether the financial instruments are credit-impaired, and:

- if the credit risk of the financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance of the financial instruments at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses and
- if there has been no significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the association measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to **\*\*\*Please enter number of months\*\*\*-month expected credit losses.**

#### *Simplified approach*

The simplified approach does not require tracking of changes in credit risk at every reporting period, but instead requires the recognition of lifetime expected credit loss at all times.

This approach is applicable to:

- trade receivables and
- lease receivables.

In measuring the expected credit loss, a provision matrix for trade receivables is used, taking into consideration various data to get to an expected credit loss (i.e. diversity of its customer base, appropriate groupings of its historical loss experience, etc).

#### *Purchased or originated credit-impaired approach*

For financial assets that are considered to be credit-impaired (not on acquisition or originations), the association measures any change in its lifetime expected credit loss as the difference between the asset's gross carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. Any adjustment is recognised in profit or loss as an impairment gain or loss.

Evidence of credit impairment includes:

- significant financial difficulty of the issuer or borrower
- a breach of contract (e.g. default or past due event)
- where a lender has granted to the borrower a concession, due to the borrower's financial difficulty, that the lender would not otherwise consider
- the likelihood that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation and
- the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset because of financial difficulties.

#### *Low credit risk operational simplification approach*

If a financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the initial reporting date, the association assumes that the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition and, accordingly, it can continue to recognise a loss allowance of **\*\*\*Please enter number of months\*\*\*-month expected credit loss.**

In order to make such a determination that the financial asset has low credit risk, the association applies its internal credit risk ratings or other methodologies using a globally comparable definition of low credit risk.

A financial asset is considered to have low credit risk if:

- there is a low risk of default by the borrower

- 
- the borrower has strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term and
  - adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term, may, but not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

A financial asset is not considered to carry low credit risk merely due to existence of collateral, or because a borrower has a lower risk of default than the risk inherent in the financial assets, or lower than the credit risk of the jurisdiction in which it operates.

*Recognition of expected credit losses in financial statements*

At each reporting date, the association recognises the movement in the loss allowance as an impairment gain or loss in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

The carrying amount of financial assets measured at amortised cost includes the loss allowance relating to that asset.

Assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are recognised at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in other comprehensive income. The amount in relation to change in credit risk is transferred from other comprehensive income to profit or loss at every reporting period.

For financial assets that are unrecognised (e.g. loan commitments yet to be drawn, financial guarantees), a provision for loss allowance is created in the statement of financial position to recognise the loss allowance.
